# **High School Graduation**



## What are the requirements for high school graduation?<sup>1</sup>

To graduate, a student must earn credits in the required high school courses and achieve the required grade point average, with the number of credits, required courses, and required grade point average varying based upon which graduation option the student selects.<sup>2</sup> The three graduation options (traditional 24-credit option, accelerated 18-credit College Preparatory Program option, and accelerated 18-credit Career Preparatory Program option) are discussed below. Students may also receive a standard high school diploma in Florida by successfully completing the International Baccalaureate (IB) or Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) program curricula.

In addition, to receive a standard high school diploma, each student is currently required to pass the grade 10 Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test (FCAT) in Reading and Mathematics or attain concordant scores on either the SAT or ACT tests.<sup>3</sup>

The following table displays the FCAT passing scores and concordant scores on the SAT and ACT tests for the 2010-2011 academic year:

## What options do students have for satisfying high school graduation requirements?

There are five options:

- ❖ A traditional 24-credit option that may be completed in 4 years;<sup>5</sup>
- ❖ The IB curriculum may be completed:
- ❖ The AICE curriculum may be completed:
- ❖ An accelerated 18-credit College Preparatory Program option that may be completed in 3 years; or
- ❖ An accelerated 18-credit Career Preparatory Program option that may be completed in 3 years.<sup>7</sup>

The following table compares the credit requirements<sup>8</sup> for three options for students entering grade 9 in the 2010-2011 academic year:

The following table compares the grade point average required for each of the options:

# May a district school board establish graduation requirements in excess of the statewide requirements?

District school boards are authorized to adopt policies and procedures governing graduation requirements and must adopt rules for admitting, classifying, promoting, and graduating students. School boards are also authorized, in accordance with the guiding principles for secondary school redesign set forth in current law, to address additional course requirements for promotion and graduation in the district's student progression plan. 20

District school boards are prohibited from establishing graduation requirements in excess of the statutory requirements for the accelerated 18-credit graduation options.<sup>21</sup>

For a student who enters grade 9 in or after the 2007-08 academic year, state law does not specifically authorize the district school board to establish graduation requirements in excess of the minimum requirements for the traditional 24-credit graduation option. However, state law does not prohibit such and school districts retain general statutory authority for adopting graduation requirements. <sup>23</sup>

#### How and when do students decide on a graduation option?

A district school board must provide students in grades 6 through 9 and their parents with information concerning the traditional 24-credit graduation option and both accelerated 18-credit graduation options. This information must include an explanation of the curriculum requirements, timeframes for achieving each graduation option, and the advantages and disadvantages of each option. <sup>24</sup>

Selection of one of the graduation options must be made before the end of 9th grade and is exclusively the decision of the student and his or her parent. <sup>25</sup> If a student selects one of the accelerated 18-credit graduation options, the student and parent must meet with designated school personnel for an explanation of the requirements, advantages, and disadvantages of the accelerated graduation options, and the student must receive his or her parent's written consent. <sup>26</sup> If a student and parent fail to make a selection by the end of 9th grade, the student is considered to have selected the traditional 24-credit graduation option. <sup>27</sup>

A student who selects an accelerated 18-credit graduation option has the right to change to the traditional 24-credit graduation option at any time. <sup>28</sup> In addition, a student who selects an accelerated 18-credit graduation option is automatically moved to the traditional 24-credit graduation option if the student:

- ❖ Fails to earn 5 credits by the end of 9th grade;
- ❖ Fails to earn 11 credits by the end of 10th grade;
- ❖ Does not earn a score of 3 or higher on the grade 10 FCAT Writing; or
- ❖ Does not complete the required credits and have the required grade point average by the end of 11th grade. <sup>29</sup>
