



Florida Private Student Assistance Grant Program

What is the Florida Private Student Assistance Grant Program?

The Florida Private Student Assistance Grant Program, one of four financial assistance programs that comprise the Florida Student Assistance Grant Program, provides need-based financial aid to eligible full-time degree-seeking students enrolled in certain independent non-profit colleges and universities in Florida.¹ For the 2010-11 academic year, the minimum annual grant award is \$200 and the maximum is \$2,235.²

The program is administered by participating colleges and universities in accordance with rules of the State Board of Education.³

What are the student eligibility criteria for a Florida Private Student Assistance Grant?

To be considered for a grant, a student:

- ❖ Must have resided in Florida for at least one year prior to receipt of the grant and must be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen.
- ❖ Must enroll as a full-time student in an associate or baccalaureate degree program at a participating postsecondary institution for a minimum of 12 credit hours per term.
- ❖ May not have previously received a bachelor's degree.
- ❖ Must apply for a Federal Pell Grant by completing the *Free Application for Federal Student Aid* (FAFSA), which determines the amount of the student's estimated family contribution (EFC).⁴ The student's EFC may not exceed a maximum amount annually established by the Florida Department of Education (DOE). The maximum amount for the 2010-11 academic year is \$6,080.⁵
- ❖ Must demonstrate a minimum unmet financial need of \$200.
- ❖ May not owe a repayment or be in default on any state or federal grant, loan, or scholarship program unless satisfactory arrangements for repayment have been made.
- ❖ Must meet any application procedures and deadlines established by the participating institution.⁶

What are the renewal criteria for a Florida Private Student Assistance Grant?

A student's eligibility to renew the grant is determined at the end of the second semester or third quarter of each academic year. To be considered for renewal, a student must have earned a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.0 on a 4.0 scale and 12 credit hours for each term an award was received. Credit hours earned during the previous summer may be counted toward the total number of credit hours required. The student must also annually complete the FAFSA and demonstrate unmet financial need.⁷

Students should consult with their postsecondary institutions for renewal application procedures and deadlines.⁸

How is a student's unmet financial need calculated?

A student's unmet financial need is determined by the institutional cost of attendance, less the EFC as determined by the FAFSA, and less aid from other sources such as federal grants, state grants, and institutional aid (excluding loans).⁹ A demonstrated unmet need of less than \$200 renders the student ineligible for a grant.¹⁰

Cost of Attendance
- Expected Family Contribution

= Unmet Financial Need

How are grant recipients selected and award amounts determined?

Participating postsecondary institutions are required to determine the eligibility of each student applicant for an initial or renewal grant award and to calculate the award amount.¹¹ The award amount is based on the eligible student's unmet financial need and must be between \$200 and the average cost of tuition and other registration fees for 30 hours at state universities plus \$1,000, unless a different maximum award amount is established in the General Appropriations Act (GAA).¹² The 2010-11 GAA establishes a maximum award amount of \$2,235 for the 2010-11 academic year.¹³ Grant awards are distributed by the institution to eligible students until program

funding is depleted based on a selection process that prioritizes applicants with the lowest EFCs and highest unmet need.¹⁴

Where may a student use a Florida Private Student Assistance Grant?

The grant may be used at independent nonprofit colleges or universities that are located in and chartered as domestic corporations by the State of Florida; are accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools; and grant baccalaureate degrees.¹⁵ Thirty-three institutions are eligible to participate in the program for the 2010-11 academic year. A list of participating institutions is available on the DOE's website.¹⁶

How is the Florida Private Student Assistance Grant Program funded?

The GAA annually establishes the total amount of funding available statewide for the program. These funds are distributed by the DOE among participating institutions in accordance with a formula approved by the State Board of Education.¹⁷

The 2009-10 GAA provided \$15,875,417 for the program and specified a maximum grant award amount of \$2,069.¹⁸ In that year, a total of 15,771 students were eligible for the grant statewide. Of this number, 12,832 students received grant awards with 5,633 students receiving initial grants and 7,199 students receiving renewal grants. The average grant award amount was \$1,279.33.¹⁹

The 2010-11 GAA provides \$16,166,037 for the program and specifies a maximum award amount of \$2,235.²⁰
